
LOCAL WEDDINGS

Through cheers from the crowd and a few tears on my part, I agreed to become Jon's wife. We actually made the sport's page the following week... picture and all!!

The one thing that set our wedding apart from most is that tragically, I lost my only brother, Lance, in June of 2005, just weeks after the proposal. Knowing that this extraordinary day would come and we wouldn't have him there to share it was, at times, unbearable. I tried to incorporate several things in the wedding to remember him. Lance loved the ocean, so I lined the walkway leading up to the wedding site with small chimes, bearing the symbol of the ocean. Many people commented on how soothing the soft sounds of the chimes were as they approached. On the day of his memorial, July 4th, I had collected flowers from each of over a hundred flower arrangements and dried the petals. On the day of my wedding, I had two of his best friends scatter these petals on the aisle just before I walked down it. The string trio played a song that my brother used to serenade us with.

Then we picked up the phone and started calling! Because it was such short notice, many vendors were already booked, but they were kind enough to suggest other people to contact who might be able to help.


